Dear Secretary Noem,

We are writing in concern for several members of our community who are awaiting funds from pending Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) claims.

In May 2020, mid-Michigan was devastated by historic flooding caused by the collapse of multiple dams after two days of heavy rainfall.¹ This disaster resulted in the evacuation of more than 10,000 residents and nearly \$200 million in damages.² The flooding destroyed critical infrastructure and wiped out family homes and small businesses that served as pillars of our community. These events led to Governor Whitmer requesting a federal emergency declaration to assist Midland County's flood response,³ which President Trump approved in July 2020.⁴ Regrettably, over five years later, our residents are still waiting for FEMA to complete its reimbursement process. For example, Midland County has not received full repayment for 4 of its 8 obligated assistance programs, totaling nearly \$500,000 in outstanding funds. The village of Sanford, Michigan, which has an annual general budget of just over \$200,000, is still working with FEMA to obtain \$600,000 of their requested funds. Furthermore, multiple local businesses and recreational sites are still awaiting millions of dollars in funding owed, including the Midland Center for the Arts. These funds are not luxuries; they are lifelines for rebuilding, restoring local economies, and protecting communities from future harm.

FEMA's reimbursements are vital to our local governments and economies. We share the concern that FEMA's cumbersome processes have created barriers for communities seeking relief and need reform. We also share in the mission to streamline and improve the efficiency of the disaster assistance process to ensure other communities around the nation are not subject to the years-long delays that our region has experienced.

- 1) Midland County
- 2) Village of Sanford
- 3) Midland Center for the Arts

Our constituents and Americans nationwide deserve transparency and assurance that the federal government remains committed to aiding disaster recovery and preparedness. Thank you for your timely attention to this matter.
